What is European Approach?

- European Approach for Quality Assurance of Joint Programmes (EA)
 - Adopted by European Ministers responsible for higher education, has been developed to ease external quality assurance of these programmes: it defines standards that are based on the agreed tools of the EHEA, without applying additional national criteria. This is expected to facilitate integrated approaches to quality assurance of joint programmes, which genuinely reflect and mirror their joint character. What is European Approach?

- EA is based on one single joint programme accreditation that in principle is recognised in all EHEA countries involved. This approach should replace the separate national programme accreditations in the joint programme consortium countries.
- The **main characteristics** of the European Approach are as follows:
 - If some of the cooperating higher education institutions are required to undergo external quality assessment or accreditation at programme level, then the co-operating institution should select a suitable quality assurance agency from the list of EQAR registered agencies;
 - This agency will then use the agreed standards and procedures of the European Approach to carry out a single evaluation or accreditation of the entire joint programme;
 - The external quality assurance decision is to be accepted and recognised in all EHEA countries where the programme is offered. Countries should not apply any additional national criteria. (Rosa Becker JOINT PROGRAMMES FROM A TO Z 2020)

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What is European Approach – Reality?

- EQAR website (https://www.eqar.eu/kb/joint-programmes/nationalimplementation/) states that as of now:
 - In 17 countries European Approach is available to all higher education institutions (change from 13 in 2020)
 - In 11 countries EA is available to some higher education institutions or only under specific conditions (change from 16 in 2020)
 - In 19 countries (including Ukraine!) EA currently is not available to higher education institutions (change from 20 in 2020)
- What is more EA is sometimes permitted on case-by-case basis that goes beyond this list.



European Approach for Quality Assurance of Joint Programmes – Standards and Procedure

EA – Standards – Standard 1 - Eligibility

- 1.1 Status
 - The institutions that offer a joint programme should be recognised as higher education institutions by the relevant authorities of their countries. Their respective national legal frameworks should enable them to participate in the joint programme and, if applicable, to award a joint degree. The institutions awarding the degree(s) should ensure that the degree(s) belong to the higher education degree systems of the countries in which they are based.
- 1.2 Joint design and delivery
 - The joint programme should be offered **jointly**, **involving all cooperating institutions** in the design and delivery of the programme.
- 1.3 Cooperation Agreement
 - The terms and conditions of the joint programme should be laid down in a **cooperation agreement**. The agreement should in particular cover **the following issues**:
 - Denomination of the degree(s) awarded in the programme
 - Coordination and responsibilities of the partners involved regarding management and financial organisation (including funding, sharing of costs and income etc.)
 - Admission and selection procedures for students
 - Mobility of students and teachers
 - Examination regulations, student assessment methods, recognition of credits and degree awarding procedures in the consortium.



EA – Standards – Standard 2 - Learning Outcomes

- 2.1 Level [ESG 1.2]
 - The intended learning outcomes should align with the corresponding level in the Framework for Qualifications in the European Higher Education Area (FQ-EHEA), as well as the applicable national qualifications framework(s).
- 2.2 Disciplinary field
 - The intended learning outcomes should comprise knowledge, skills, and competencies in the respective disciplinary field(s).
- 2.3 Achievement [ESG 1.2]
 - The programme should be able to demonstrate that the intended learning outcomes are **achieved**.
- 2.4 Regulated Professions
 - If relevant for the specific joint programme, the minimum agreed training conditions specified in the European Union Directive 2005/36/EC, or relevant common trainings frameworks established under the Directive, should be taken into account.



EA – Standards – Standard 3 - Study Programme [ESG 1.2]

- 3.1 Curriculum
 - The structure and content of the curriculum should be fit to enable the students to achieve the intended learning outcomes.
- 3.2 Credits
 - The European Credit Transfer System (ECTS) should be applied properly and the distribution of credits should be clear.
- 3.3 Workload
 - A joint bachelor programme will typically amount to a total student workload of **180-240 ECTS-credits**; a joint master programme will typically amount to **90-120 ECTS-credits** and should not be less than **60 ECTS-credits at second cycle level** (credit ranges according to the (FQ-EHEA); for joint doctorates there is no credit range specified. The workload and the average time to complete the programme should be monitored.



EA – Standards – Standard 4 - Admission and Recognition [ESG 1.4]

4.1. Admission

 The admission requirements and selection procedures should be appropriate in light of the programme's level and discipline.

4.2. Recognition

 Recognition of qualifications and of periods of studies (including recognition of prior learning) should be applied in line with the Lisbon Recognition Convention and subsidiary documents.



EA – Standards – Standard 5 - Learning, Teaching and Assessment [ESG 1.3]

• 5.1 Learning and teaching

The programme should be designed to correspond with the intended learning outcomes, and the learning and teaching approaches applied should be adequate to achieve those. The diversity of students and their needs should be respected and attended to, especially in view of potential different cultural backgrounds of the students.

5.2 Assessment of students

 The examination regulations and the assessment of the achieved learning outcomes should correspond with the intended learning outcomes. They should be applied consistently among partner institutions.



- EA Standards Standard 6 Student Support [ESG 1.6]
- The student support services should contribute to the achievement of the intended learning outcomes. They should take into account specific challenges of mobile students.



EA – Standards – Standard 7 - Resources [ESG 1.5 & 1.6]

- 7.1 Staff
 - The staff should be sufficient and adequate (qualifications, professional and international experience) to implement the study programme.

7.2 Facilities

 The facilities provided should be sufficient and adequate in view of the intended learning outcomes.



EA – Standards – Standard 8 - Transparency and Documentation [ESG 1.8]

 Relevant information about the programme like admission requirements and procedures, course catalogue, examination and assessment procedures etc. should be well documented and published by taking into account specific needs of mobile students.




EA – Standards – Standard 9 - Quality Assurance [ESG 1.1 & part 1]
